In our culture, Valentine's Day has become a celebration of romantic love complete with red and pink decorations, roses, chocolates and teddy bears. It is almost impossible to get a dinner reservation and there's quite a bit of pressure to find the right present or card for the special people in your life. However, the roots of Valentine's Day are much different.



There is some debate about who the real Saint Valentine was. What we know for certain is that he was a leader in the early Christian church in Italy and was killed on February 14th in the year 269 C.E. Legend says that he secretly officiated the marriages of Christian couples during a time when Christians were being persecuted— thus February 14th came to be associated with love. I like to think that any old day of the year is a good time to celebrate love in every form—but I also think that setting aside a particular day to celebrate love is a good idea too.

So, with Valentine's Day approaching, I would like to tell you how much I love you. I have never been in a call for as long as I have been at St. Matt's. With each passing year my love for you and my trust in you and this community grows. I learn more about you— your strengths and weaknesses, foibles and passions— every day. 


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# Ash Wednesday is February 22 Lenten Wednesdays are March 1 - 29, 2023

## Ash Wednesday & Ashes

The name of the first day of Lent, Ash Wednesday, comes from the old custom of blessing ashes and marking the foreheads of the penitent faithful with ashes on this day. The ashes are prepared by burning palms from the preceding Palm Sunday. This marking is done as a symbol of the penitential character of the Lenten season. The idea comes from Old Testament times when mourners or penitents clothed themselves in sackcloth and sprinkled their heads and faces with dust or ashes. Job said, "Therefore I despise myself and repent in dust and ashes." Words of Jesus that apply may be found in Matthew 11:21, "Woe to you, Bethsaida! for if the mighty works done in you had been done in Tyre and Siden, they would have repented long ago in sackcloth and ashes." But Jesus condemned the hypocrites of his day who made such a display of their piety rather than serving God with the spiritual purpose that should accompany any outward sign of penitence. This is referred to in the following portion of the Ash Wednesday gospel:

"When you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces that their fasting may be seen of men. . . But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, that your fasting may not be seen by men but by your Father who is in secret" (Matthew 6:16-18).

# LENT 2023 "The Water Holds You"

In this season of Lent we follow Jesus' journey to the cross. With ashes, we retrace the sign of the cross on our foreheads and remember we are joined to this journey through our

baptism - a journey through death to new life. Each week during Lent, we'll reclaim the promises given when the baptismal



waters washed over you. A theme will be presented in Sunday worship and echoed on Wednesday night at a 6:15pm Family Lenten Time or 7:15pm contemplative worship (30 minutes long). Water will be our image. God's promise to hold us, like we are floating in water, will be our guide.


#### Favorite Hymns with John Paradowski

**Patti Foley** earned her master's degree in social work from Loyola University Chicago. She has spent the past 20 years of her career working as a licensed child & family therapist in intensive outpatient programs at Rogers Behavioral Health. Most recently Patti specialized in crisis intervention and safety planning with the early adolescent population. In May she transitioned to Children's Wisconsin where she provides school-based mental health services within the elementary schools in Shorewood.

**Laura Crave** is passionate about strengthening families and enhancing child well-being. She has worked for Children's Wisconsin for 6.5 years in roles spanning child welfare, child abuse prevention, and trauma informed care. Currently, she serves as the program manager of Awareness to Action, a statewide program for the primary prevention of child sexual abuse. Laura has a master's degree in social work from the University of Wisconsin- Milwaukee.

#### My Pronouns are What and Who Now?: Navigating the Changing Landscape of Being a Welcoming People



The last few decades have seen a rapid shift in acceptance and welcome of people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, marital statuses, and family structures. For those longing to be included and celebrated, it may feel like there is a long way to go, and things aren't changing quickly enough. For those who want things to stay the same, it may feel very frustrating and even infuriating to see emerging generations welcoming and celebrating identities and lifestyles that were once widely considered taboo and wrong. And even for those who want to be welcoming and affirming, it can be disorienting to navigate the changing landscape of pronouns, relationships, identities, and the like. Join Jay McDivitt (he/him/his), a former ELCA pastor of two Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregations, as he welcomes your questions and wades into the sometimes murky waters of "All Are Welcome." He is not an expert in all things LGBTQIA+\* (yes, we can talk about all that, too). He is a church leader who has worked to help congregations sing and live the promise that "All Are Welcome," while fumbling and failing countless times along the way as new challenges emerge. We'll talk about pronouns, the difference between sexual orientation and gender identity, and pretty much anything else you want to discuss (time permitting). This will be a safe place to bring all your hard, silly, confusing, even accidentally offensive questions, starting with the assumption that we are a people of Grace who are committed to growing in compassion, curiosity, and courage together.

#### March 12 The Water Will Hold You: water stories and themes in Lent

Lent is a time of renewal. We focus on the death and resurrection of Jesus - and in turn focus on our own death and resurrection found in baptism. In this session, Pastors will review additional baptismal promises such as an identity, forgiveness, and gifts to sustain us. These promises are meant to hold us, like floating in water.

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#### Guest House of Milwaukee monthly Meal Ministry *Your participation is invited!*

Since we last reported on this Meal Ministry in the August 2022 issue of The Voice, volunteers from St Matthew's have prepared and served meals each month at the Guest House, a Milwaukee homeless shelter for men. We resumed serving dinners inside the shelter in September 2022. That was after the Milwaukee County Health Department lifted pandemic restrictions on entry to the facility, during which time we prepared and dropped-off cooked meals from April 2020 to August 2022.

The residents of the Guest House homeless shelter are so thankful for these meals, which are made possible by the talents and generosity of so many volunteers. Most recently the Guest House organized the TV coverage on January 8, and they wrote: "Thank you again for your faithfulness to Guest House in providing your time, talents, and resources with us!"
