Pastor's VOICE

He leads me beside still waters; he restores my soul. - Psalm 23:2

The first congregation I served as a pastor was in Racine, a Lutheran community with Danish-American roots. In their sanctuary, hanging by wires from the ceiling was a replica of a sailing ship. It was always a curiosity for visitors and a great opportunity to draw their focus to what stood directly under the ship, the baptismal font. The imagery conveys, "We are, together, sailing on the waters of our baptism to our heavenly home." The Danes, whose country was surrounded primarily by seas, knew the dangers and the necessities of sailing. God's promises in baptism gave them comfort, hope, and a home.

The Church's season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, February 22nd. For 40 days we follow Jesus' journey to the cross and his resurrection - that we might focus on our own death and resurrection through baptism. Our prayer is that God might renew us in the gift of baptism, that we may provide for those who are poor, pray for those in need, fast from self-indulgence, and above all that we may find our treasure in the life of Jesus Christ.

Water is essential to life. As Christians water is one of the first sacred elements we encounter in our baptism. This year we will be celebrating our Lenten season with "The Water Holds You." Therefore, it is only fitting that our designated Lenten offerings go to water. Nearly a billion people – one of every seven people in the world today – lack access to clean, safe drinking water. These individuals must walk, on average, 3.7 miles each day to fetch water, and often the water they do find is not safe to drink. Combined, unclean water and sanitation are the world's second largest killer of children.

Did you know that ELCA Good Gifts help provide water with items as basic as hygiene kits and water filters up to a simple water well that can help as many as 500 families gain access to clean, safe water.



For \$2500, a community can receive a simple water well, through the ELCA World Hunger and its partners. Through one well, as many as 500 families will gain access to clean, safe water. The community will be healthier. People will spend less money on medical expenses and more on food and education. And instead of spending hours each day gathering water for the family, women and children will have more time for work or school.

Can You Give the Gift of Education to a Student in El Salvador?

Pan de Vida, our sister parish in El Salvador, is asking for our help to make sure the children of their congregation have the opportunity to attend school. For many families in the congregation, the costs of education are out of reach. The estimated monthly income for families in rural areas is \$92. And even for the few families who receive remittances from family members in the US, the monthly average increases by only about \$100. School costs per child range from \$200 per year for the youngest students to \$1600 for university tuition. When you multiply that by several kids, you can see how difficult it is for families to come up with these costs, especially for older grades.

Yet education is what lifts kids out of poverty. In her request for a scholarship program at St. Matthew's, Pastora Emely Chavez said:

Right now, many young people, men and women, see migration or gang integration as the only options for their future. But we need to encourage them to imagine a different future and aspire to more. Accompanying young people, especially those at high risk, will be an invaluable part of our program.

The goal of the program is to contribute to the social well-being and equality of young people by keeping kids in school and to provide students with the necessary tools to lift them out of poverty.

We invite you to be part of the scholarship program to expand opportunity for the kids of Pan de Vida. There are 39 students, ranging from kindergarten through university who need assistance.

Tuition costs by grade level are:

- Grade School \$200 \$250
- Middle School \$300 \$350
- High School \$450
- University \$1600

We welcome one-time or ongoing donations of any amount. Just as we do with our scholarship program for Sing'isi Lutheran in Tanzania, we will transfer funds to Pan de Vida twice a year to be distributed to the students. We will share regular updates on the children who receive financial assistance.

"Trust" was at the heart of the business of the annual meeting

held during the Education hour on January 29th. Our leaders provided examples of the many blessings that have appeared out of a challenging year 2022. There is trust that the Holy Spirit is guiding our leaders and that our leaders are open to trust this guidance.

Rob Wedel, our congregation's treasurer, gave a positive report of how our budget deficit was able to be almost wiped out due to careful financial stewardship and strong giving in December. The carefully considered budget for 2023 was passed unanimously with no questions or discussion.

Tara Laatsch, the outgoing congregational president, led the meeting, including the more tedious sections on approving bylaws and amendments to the constitution.

Continuing to trust, meeting attendees voted unanimously to approve all of these mostly minor changes.

Diane DuBois, representing the Call Committee, gave an update that the Call Committee continues to interview candidates who show interest in the lead pastor position, and that our MSP (a detailed description of our church) has been updated with postpandemic numbers. The Call Committee thanks you for your patience and trust in the process as we await a new lead pastor.

Pastors Ann and Karen gave a joint pastors' report, with Pastor Ann challenging us to stop waiting for a new pastor, and to get involved in ministry *now*, and the right lead pastor will join us in the work already in progress.

The leaders of St. Matthew's would like to thank YOU, the people of St. Matthew's, for your trust and support as we renew our determination to carry out God's work through St. Matthew's ministries. *To God be the Glory!*

Update from St. Matthew's Human Resources Committee:

Pastor Ann Williams, 3/4 time permanent Associate Pastor

During this interim time, Pastor Ann has been serving an additional 1/4 time through a contractual agreement. This year, St. Matt's has asked her to make this a permanent arrangement. Her responsibilities have expanded to include additional teaching, preaching, support work with Council, and staff supervision, along with oversight of care ministries.

Al has accepted an expanded role of responsibility at St. Matthew's that includes oversight of property, guest groups, and staff supervision.

He will eventually relinquish oversight of Sunday worship volunteers. This role reflects a modified version of the Church Administrator role that the Organizational Development Team envisioned.

Julia has left this position at the end of 2022 to assume leadership for L'Arche Community-Milwaukee. "My Pronouns are What and Who Now?" Navigating the Changing Landscape of Being a Welcoming People

Jay McDivitt, former ELCA pastor and Pastor Ann Williams' spouse

The last few decades have seen a rapid shift in acceptance and welcome of people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, marital statuses, and family structures. For those longing to be included and celebrated, it may feel like there is a long way to go, and things aren't changing quickly enough. For those who want things to stay the same, it may feel very frustrating and even infuriating to see emerging generations welcoming and celebrating identities and lifestyles that were once widely considered taboo and wrong. Join Jay McDivitt (he/him/his), a former ELCA pastor of two Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregations, as he welcomes your questions

and wades into the sometimes murky waters of "All Are Welcome." He is not an expert in all things LGBTQIA+* (yes, we can talk about all that, too). He is a church leader who has worked to help congregations sing and live the promise that "All Are Welcome," while fumbling and failing countless times along the way as new challenges emerge. We'll talk about pronouns, the difference between sexual orientation and gender identity, and pretty much anything else you want to discuss (time permitting). This will be a safe place to bring all your hard, silly, confusing, even accidentally offensive questions, starting with the assumption that we are a people of Grace who are committed to growing in compassion, curiosity, and courage together.

Benedict Center Sisters' Program

Center do:

The Sisters Program helps women in the street-based sex trade find hope and live healthier and safer lives through a harm reduction and housing-first approach. Many women at the Sisters Program have dealth with violence all their lives including childhood sexual abuse, repeated sexual assaults as a teen and adult, violent relationships and past experiences of being trafficked as well as current traffickers controlling them.

Many of the issues women face are systemic harms - poverty, substance use disorders, and homelessness - that require community solutions like more affordable housing, more living-wage jobs and changes to policies that stop women from making progress in their lives.



Lutheran Disaster Response responds to those affected by the earthquake in the Middle East:


