Welcome to worship on this first Sunday of a new year. Let us praise the God who is always doing something new! Jesus often gathered for worship with his disciples and others. Following his example, we gather now to grow in God and glorify his name. Welcome!

Introduction for the Day: *Within the gospel reading's profound word lies the simple message that God is revealed in a human person. Though we may try to understand how the Word existed with God from the beginning of time, the wonder we celebrate at Christmas is that the Word continues to dwell among us. Christ comes among us in the gathered assembly, the scriptures, the waters of new birth, and the bread and the wine. Through these ordinary gifts we receive*

the fullness of God's grace and truth.

It's Name Tag Sunday: We wear nametags on the 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month in order for us to know more people on Sunday mornings.

First of all, if you give electronically, via Vanco Simply Giving, credit cards or direct from your bank, you will not be receiving envelopes for 2020. For those who will get envelopes, the boxes will be a little different. There will not be extra envelopes for Debt Reduction or Communion. If you are contributing to those funds, please use the normal weekly envelope and write in your fund on the blank line. Finally, if you do not see a box of envelopes and you are expecting one, let the office know and AI will get you a box of envelopes.

Credit Card Kiosk I hope most of you have seen our Credit Card Kiosk in the main commons area. You can now pay via a credit card. There are many categories already entered, like Contributions or Coffee. We will also have buttons when we are doing a special ask for a specific fund. It is really easy, you choose your fund, your amount and then either swipe or dip your card. If you have used Square before and have requested a receipt via email, you will automatically be sent a receipt. If you have not used Square, it will ask you if you want a receipt emailed to you. **One word of caution, if you use your Apple Pay function on your phone, the office will not get the name of cardholder.** So, if you use your tap to pay function, let the office know, so you can get proper credit on your annual contribution report.

Featuring speaker, journalist, author Meg Jones

Long before Japanese bombs rained down on Pearl Harbor, Milwaukee was the “Machine Shop to the World.” Thanks to the city’s large industrial base, factories quickly retooled and mobilized for wartime production. Harley-Davidson produced thousands of military motorbikes, and Falk Corporation churned out gears that turned the propellers on hundreds of ships. Locals sacrificed their lives for the cause—Mayor Carl Zeidler went missing at sea, USS Arizona captain Franklin Van Valkenburgh refused to leave the bridge of his burning battleship and Mildred Harnack joined the Nazi resistance movement and was executed on direct orders from Hitler. Embedded with German and American troops, Milwaukee journalists H.V. Kaltenborn, Louis Lochner and Dickey Chapelle sent dispatches from the front lines. Through past interviews and archival materials, author Meg Jones reveals these and other patriotic stories. ***Please sign up at the Welcome Center so that we may plan ahead for food and seating.
